Protect your personal information at tax time

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) is reminding people to protect their personal information at tax time.

Your personal information is valuable. Always be aware of what information you share.

If a scammer knows enough about your identity, they can pretend to be you and:

- lodge false tax returns
- gain access to your superannuation (super)
- commit fraud in your name
- access your bank account ,or
- take out loans in your name.

How to spot a scam

Scams can be difficult to spot, here are some warning signs that it could be a scam:

- emails, text messages or social media interactions that ask you to click a link and provide personal information or provide copies of identity documents
- job ads that ask for your tax file number (TFN) as part of the application process
- online ads that ask for your personal information such as your bank account details or ATO online/myGov sign in details.

If someone claiming to be from the ATO contacts you via email or SMS and advises that you have a debt or are owed a refund or asks you to enter your myGov sign-in details or bank or personal details such as your TFN, do not click on links or provide any details.

We will never send an SMS or email that contains a link to log on to our online services.

How to stay safe from scams

Your personal details are very important, so only share them with people you trust. Be careful when sharing your:

- full name
- date of birth
- current address
- myGov and ATO online login details
- TFN
- passwords
- bank account numbers
- credit card details
- driver's licence or passport details.

What to do if you suspect a scam

Here are some steps you can take if you think you have been contacted by a scammer:

Think carefully about responding to an email or text. Always check the contact details first.

- Take a screenshot of the text or forward the **entire email** to ReportScams@ato.gov.au then delete the suspicious text message or email
- Hang up the phone if someone says they're from the ATO and the caller is threatening you
- Don't click on links, instead access online services by typing it directly into your internet browser.
- Ask someone you trust if you feel unsure about a communication that says it's from the ATO, or call the ATO on **1800 008 540** to check if it is real.
